Hatred toward young African American males

In the United States, multiple innocent African American males have been killed. I look at this as an issue because I believe that Black teens are killed because of the

color of their skin. There have been different occasions where innocent Black teens or just young males period are killed by white cops. There was a time, 2014 to be exact, where teens and young males such as Tamir Rice, who was only 12 years old, was shot by a police officer after brandishing what turned out to be a B.B. gun, on Nov. 22, 2014 in Cleveland, Ohio. When officers arrived on the scene, the officers said that Rice reached for his toy, but he was not pointing it at them. That's when an officer fired two shots at Rice from a distance.

Another example is Michael Brown, who was killed by police officers on Aug. 9, 2014 in Ferguson, Missouri. Brown was only 18 years old when he was shot multiple times by a white police officer, Darren Wilson. According to the autopsy, Brown was shot six times, including twice in the head and four times in his right arm. Since Brown died, there have been 14 males shot by police officers.

In Margaret Walker's "Agenda for Action: Black Art and Letters," she talks about five major issues that she was concerned about. The five major issues are racial enmity and hatred generating violence; perpetual war dating from the beginning of the century;, industrial contamination of all nature: earth, water and air; the extreme dilemma of urban life with the new controlling economy of crime and drugs; and finally, political chaos and economic collapse.

The issue that I chose that related to Walker is racial enmity and hatred generating violence. I chose this topic because although Walker wrote "Agenda for Action: Black Art and Letters" in 1972, racism still exists and fuels violence to take place in 2022. What I mean by "violence takes place" is that when two or more people have an altercation, someone who is armed will hurt or kill the other because of a racist comment that could be avoided.

For example, Trayvon Martin, who

was 17 years old, was shot and killed on Feb. 26, 2012, in Sanford, Florida while visiting his father Tracy Martin. Martin was killed by George Zimmerman, a 28-year-old mixed race Hispanic man, when the two had an argument and Martin was unarmed. Walker felt as if the white community treated the black community a certain way because it was always Blacks having to respect the whites no matter if the whites disrespected the Blacks. There are many white individuals who are very respectful and kind toward the African American community, so I cannot judge all white Americans based off of what their ancestors did. There are some white individuals who are still disrespectful because sometimes we [African Americans] are still called the "N word."

Another individual who was concerned about the same issue was Nikki Giovanny. Giovanny delivered a message about the massacre that occurred on the Virginia Tech Campus at a convocation in 2007. She wrote a poem titled, "We Are Virginia Tech" and basically, she didn't just focus on a particular race. What I mean is she gave multiple examples that concerned different races, ethnicities and even animals such as "A child in African dving of AIDS, the invisible children walking the night away to avoid being captured by the rouge army, the baby elephant watching his community being devastated for ivory, the Mexican child looking for fresh water, the Appalachian infant killed in the middle of the night in his crib in the home his father built with his own hands being run over by a boulder because the land was destabilized." I agree with the examples that she gave, because everyday someone is going through a tragedy and they wonder why or how it occurred out of nowhere.

Something that stood out to me in her poem is when she said "We are not moving on, we are embracing our mourning." This stood out to me because when tragedies occur, individuals have no choice but to move on because there's nothing that they can do about it. With her, she would like to hold on to what happened so that it can never be forgotten. Also, I believe that she is holding on because of those who were killed so that they wouldn't be left behind and they are still in their spirits and in their minds.


consideration during voting times. With busy college lives consisting of classes at various times and numerous side activities where attendance is required, college students have a hard time squeezing in their civic duty.


field adjacent to Ras Branch Field.

the executive director for Mississippi Public Broadcasting and last serving at Jo Lesley State Veterans Holmes as a Veterans Service Officer.

Asken's other career experience includes serving as a legal secretary for Morgan & Morgan of Kosciusko (1980-1983), Daniel, Coker, Norton and Bell (1983-1984) and Timothy Gowan (1987-1988).

Holmes Community College will honor Derek Starling, Sr. of Madison as the 2022 Alumnus of the Year. This is among one of the college's highest alumni honors. Starling is the Alumni Association's outgoing president; he served the college for a two-year term and prior to that role he served two years as vice president.

Starling will be awarded this honor during a presentation in McDaniel Hall Auditorium on Oct. 27. The presentation will be part of Holmes' Homecoming festivities and Starling will also be recognized on the field prior to

the game against Southwest Mississippi Community College.

A graduate of Canton High School, he played men's varsity basketball under Coach Bennie Kimble from 1984-1986. During his time as a Bulldog, Starling, the team captain, was named to the All-Region 23 Team, MJCAA All-State and chosen to play in the MJCAA All-Star game. Other accolades he received included the Academic Award, the Sportsmanship Award, the Ras Branch Award and the Bulldog Award. In 2017, he was inducted into the Holmes Sports Hall of Fame for his

basketball accomplishments.

Outside of basketball, Starling was president of Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA), a Hall of Fame inductee, an honor student and on the Homecoming Court in 1985. He was not the only Starling child who attended Holmes his sister, Diane Starling Jackson, and his brother, Dwayne Starling, are Holmes alumni, as well.

Starling recalls many fond memories from his time as a Bulldog.

By playing basketball at Holmes, we were able to travel to the far reaches of this great state and meet some wonderful people, all while being great ambassadors for this great college. Finally, I remember all the evenings we spent sitting outside all over the campus."

Upon graduation from Holmes, he attended Mississippi State University and earned his bachelor's in industrial and systems engineering with a minor in mathematics. Starling's basketball career ended in the fall of 1986 while at MSU, due to a knee injury. Today, he is the owner and principal of SOL Engineering Services, headquartered in Jackson. Prior to owning SOL Engineering, he served as corporate

director of quality and enterprise resource planning at Proliance, Inc., in New Haven, Connecticut. He has also worked as vice president of Magnolia Management Group and as quality section manager of Baxter Healthcare, Inc.

Some of the honors that Starling has received include: Small Business Administration's Mississippi Business Person of the Year (2015); membership on the Canton School Board for 17 years, eight of which he served as chairman; MSU Department of Industrial & System Engineering Advisory Board member (2018-present); inducted as a fellow into the society of American Military Engineers (2022) and lifetime member of the Holmes Alumni Association.

Starling and his wife, Daphenia, have one son, Derek, who is 16.

Maj. Gen. William J. Lutz named Veteran of the Year

Major General William J. Lutz will be recognized for his service in the United States Air Force and the Mississippi Air National Guard at Holmes Community College on Oct. 27 in Goodman.

Maj. Gen. Lutz, a Madison County native, retired with 38 years of service. In 1968, he graduated from Mississippi State University and was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force Reserve. The same year, Maj. Gen. Lutz entered the U.S. Air Force Pilot Training School at Webb Air Force Base in Texas and continued on with forward air control training in the summer of 1969. He was called to Vietnam in August of 1969 as a for-

ward air controller.

From 1970-1975, Maj. Gen. Lutz continued to serve in the Air Force in several different capacities in the Special Wing Operations as a fighter pilot. The next several years he was promoted to the Air Ground Operation School instructor.

Continuing to follow his love of flying, he joined the Mississippi Air National Guard 172nd Airlift Wing as C-130 pilot then a C-141 pilot and retired in 2006 from the Air Force with a rank of Major General as Assistant Adjutant General and Commander MS ANG. His command pilot experience totals more than 8,000 flying hours including over 900 combat missions

and 1950 combat hours.

Maj. Gen. Lutz furthered his degree in 1982 when he graduated from Mississippi College Law School and continued to serve, completing Air Command and Staff College in 1985 in Maxwell Air Force Base and National Security Management, Fort Lesley J. McNair, Washington, D.C., 1989.

Maj. Gen. Lutz and his wife, Betty, reside in Ridgeland. He served as the Chancery Judge for Holmes, Leake, Madison and Yazoo counties for 11 years (1995-2006) and currently serves as the Senior Status Mississippi Trial-Judge.

Meet Goodman Campus Head Librarian Daniel Shemwell

As you step into McMorrough Library, the first thing you notice is the front desk. It is in the center of view of a guest and behind it, often, the Head Librarian, Daniel

Shemwell, will be standing there. He could be doing various tasks, from helping a student figure out how to print an assignment to aiding a professor in various tasks. Shemwell is the heart of McMorrough Library, found on the Goodman Campus, the main campus out of two more (Ridgeland and Grenada).

Shemwell is well-spoken, matched well with his earnest tone. He is accommodating and attentive to those around him, a necessary personality trait considering the setting of his work. When asked to be interviewed to be a source in the student newspaper The Growl, Shemwell was amiable in his willingness, quick to provide a suitable time to oblige the interviewee.

The role of Shemwell as head librarian varies in type, from providing user services to helping connect the students and staff to the information they need, to ordering, cataloging and preparing materials. Shemwell mentioned that "while typical four-year universities have specialized librarians to work with thousands of students as opposed to a couple of thousands in a community college . . . here I do every aspect of the library [work] except for acquisitions." Not only that, Shemwell also plays a major part in maintaining the library databases and supervising the work-study students.

There are many students that are looking to work as a librarian, and when Shemwell was asked if there was any advice, he would like to share he replied that, "My best advice is that you find a school that is accredited.

.. One that offers a wide variety of things. You need to find a field that will teach you how to catalog and how to use metadata . . . Many schools don't focus on that aspect." While school librarians are the only type to be required to obtain a certificate in Mississippi (Mississippi Librarian Certification, n.d.), the educational requirement of a master's degree in library and information science is necessary for entry-level positions.

McMorrough Library tends to change its theme with the campus events and holidays. Shemwell was

asked how the library and staff work around it.

"Well we usually plan everything with it," Shemwell said. "For most of our events, we plan to involve the library and/or our students. Our Christmas tree that we put up we try to get students to come and hang stuff if they wanted. For Halloween, we tend to have a trick-or-treat [activity]. We don't try to plan around holidays, we try to plan into them."

Not only does the library fix its schedule around different celebrations, it also hosts different events. Shemwell in particular mentioned that this year the library has a "Civil War event planned . . . there will be speakers and things like that . . . there are a lot of things that we like to do that involve our students." Just the preceding semester in the spring, the library helped host an open lecture for Humanities Teacher Award winner Lashonda Levy entitled "Beauty and Poise: Women Writers of the Harlem Renaissance."

Aside from the huge catalog of books, movies and video games that the library offers, there is a certain space in the back of the library commonly known as 'The Makerspace' where Shemwell and his work-study students work on 3D and laser print-

ers as well as illuminators and various tools to create whatever the campus and community might need. When asked what Shemwell would like to say to our dear readers, he courteously replied "Come use the library! We are here to help."


According to Dr. Coulter, appointments can be scheduled through WConline. Links and QR codes can be found at various locations across campus. For

According to the American Cancer Society's website, an estimated 287,850 new cases of invasive breast cancer will be diagnosed among women this year. Additionally, breast cancer is the most common cancer diagnosed among U.S. women and is the second leading cause of death from cancer among women after lung cancer. Although breast cancer is a predominantly female disease, approximately 2,710 new cases will occur among men this year.

"I urge everyone to stay abreast of their health and wellness," Dr. Mackey said. "Eat right and stay active. If you notice any changes to your body, seek the advice of a healthcare expert and get screened. Too often we prioritize so many things in life over our health when it should be a top priority. If you are not well, you can't do those other things.

"In the event that you are diagnosed with this awful disease, know that the American Cancer Society is here to help," Dr. Mackey said. 'They have a host of resources and support for survivors, thrivers and their caregivers. They provide lodging, rides to treatment and a listening ear along with funding for research so that we may one day say that there is a cure for cancer.

"I want everyone to stand up and support their efforts," Dr. Mackey said. "I am standing on the shoulders of those survivors before me and I must strengthen and broaden my shoulders for those diagnosed after me by being an advocate and supporter. October is Breast Cancer Awareness month so let's wear pink and canvass our communities for support."

An accomplished leader in the field of academia, Dr. Mackey holds a Doctor of Philosophy in Community College Leadership, a Master of Science in Secondary Mathematics Education and a Bachelor of Arts in

Mathematics from Mississippi State University. Prior to her current position at Holmes, she served as vice president for instruction at East Central Community College for 10 years, and has been an adjunct mathematics instructor for Jackson State University since 2014. Before East Central, she worked for East Mississippi Community College for 12 years, holding the roles of associate dean of instruction, mathematics instructor and Phi Theta Kappa honor society advisor. Dr. Mackey also held several positions at MSU while earning her degrees and is a 2010 graduate of the Mississippi Community College Leadership Academy.

As one who is no stranger to community involvement and leadership roles, Dr. Mackey is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated; the Mississippi State University Department of Educational Leadership Advisory Board, the National Academic Advising Association (NACDA) and of course, a volunteer with the American Cancer Society. She and her husband, Dr. Shawn Mackey, reside in Madison and have three children: Christopher, Shawn Jr. and Matthew. In her spare time, she enjoys traveling, reading, spending time with her family and mentoring others.

"Dr. Mackey is one of our incredible survivors who continues to lead this journey every day for others who are in the fight," said American Cancer Society Executive Director Jennifer Bennett. "She gives so much hope to others with her story of perseverance and resilience. Dr. Mackey is one of the reasons why we continue to do what we do every day, fight for the day that nobody will hear the words you have cancer!
